I would emphasize the importance of practicing and always striving to improve both oral and written communication skills, as well as understanding the details of the contract for any given project. Lastly and most importantly, I would recommend ALWAYS going the extra mile with a handwritten thank you card. I write about 400 cards a year to colleagues, friends, and family. Expressing gratitude in all aspects of our lives is wildly important and good for our souls!

It's rewarding to see your efforts and eventually your final projects serve both local, regional, and national audiences. In addition, I have a strong memory – especially when it comes to people. Remembering a small detail about someone or their family goes **WAY** farther than you think it may.
